* Why have a Cohort Requirement. (A cohort can be a family, Den, patrol or group of no more than 10 youth.)	Even though a phase allows for greater group sizes, Scouts should stay in groups of 10-12 at all times. (Phase 2 Washington groups should keep cohorts to 6 people.) These Cohorts (patrols, Dens) must maintain social distancing and should only act with each other. A Troop with a meeting space large enough could have 3-5 cohorts (depending on the phase), but these cohorts act independently. This ensures proper social distancing control and the ability to utilize contact tracing.							
Why is it important to not mix cohorts.	Participating in any social activity during these times puts one at risk for infection. Since infected people could not have any symptoms, you will not be able to fully protect yourself. You may be young and healthy but you could unwittingly infect someone who is not. By limiting our cohorts to small groups we limit the extent of the exposure in the event that infection occurs. By mixing cohorts you could take an exposure of 6-8 people and make it an exposure of 20-30 or more. Family members in separate groups run the risk of spreading an infection between groups. Thus siblings should be encouraged to participate in the same cohorts when possible.							
** Travel Guidelines.	Oregon and Washington do not have any travel restrictions. The guidelines we have for Travel are guidance from our Council Covid-19 Task Force. Most of the guidelines in both states have to do with assembly. For "Essential Travel," we recommend only virtual activities. For "Limited Travel," we recommend reduced interaction with the public to limit risk to others and Scouts in counties whose phase is different than yours. In Phase 2 Oregon or Phase 3 Washington, you can responsibly interact with the public in stores, restaurants, and public spaces.							
Carpool.	The Council Covid Task Force has approved carpooling using CDC guidelines for Scouting activities as of 10/6/20. Carpooling is a risky activity due to the duration, and close contact in a vehicle. Units and families should take this into consideration prior to carpooling. A unit or family can choose to carpool to meetings, or Scouting activities. Must wear masks, vents should be on fresh air not recirculated settings, limit car capacity, riders only from the same cohort. (See cohort rules above). Parents of a Scout can be drivers of carpool limited to their child's cohort. (Don't mix cohorts.) Sanitize vehicles often, carry sanitizer in the vehicle, limit public stops, (supermarket, restaurants, etc). Maintain social distancing rules outside of traveling.
