ZOOM MEETING TIPS

WHEN SETTING UP YOUR MEETING:

- Prior to Meeting:
 - Set up your meeting and email meeting code, only email to those in your Cub Scout Pack, set up a new meeting in Zoom for each meeting so there is a new security code
 - Pre-assign other adults to help as co-hosts, ask them to do specific tasks (monitor chat room, help present w/ assigned slides)
 - Take a look at the slide deck. You could pre-assign older Scouts to present some slides
- In Settings, turn off:
 - Annotation (prevents Scouts from writing on screen)
- At beginning of meeting
 - Mute everyone and select "do not let participants unmute themselves"
 - Make additional adults co-hosts
 - You can keep the chat open, but likely you will want to close the chat to "host only", the Scouts tend to spam the chat.

FOR THIS MEETING:

• The Lions and the Wolves need to be prepped to host the flag ceremony. Ask the Lions to say the pledge and explain what it needs to be a good leader and citizen, and two members of the Wolf den to say the Scout Oath, and Scout Law. You can also split up the Oath and Law to include more people or have them say it at the same time (Zoom sound does not work great with multiple people, but that is okay).

Welcome to our Cub Scout Meeting! We will start at (enter time) SLIDE 2

Today we will learn about flag ceremonies, the meanings behind our names, we will meet Scout friends from across the globe, take a breakfast quiz, and more!

SLIDE 3

What is a flag ceremony? Our country's flag is more than just a piece of cloth. It's a symbol of America. It represents our past, our present and our future, which means the flag of the United States must be honored and treated with respect. You can fly the flag every day of the year, but you have to do it the right way. Often at the beginning of Scout meetings we say the pledge and fly our flag. Today the Lions and Wolves will help us with our flag ceremony, but first let's watch this video about raising the colors.

SLIDE 5

When taking down the flag, you can't just fold it any old way. Hold it at waist level between yourself and another person, fold it in half lengthwise, then fold it in half lengthwise again, always keeping the blue field on the outside. While one person holds the flag by the blue field, the other should make triangular folds from the opposite end until only the blue field is available. If you have a flag at home, ask an adult to help you fold it.

SLIDE 6

Now the Lion Den will lead us in the pledge, Lions please raise your hand so we can unmute you. (have a Lion leader lead this, or start saying the pledge and have them join you). And now the Lions will share what it means to be a good citizen and a good leader.

SLIDE 7

Great Job Lions! Wolves, please raise your hands and we will unmute you for the Scout Oath and Law (have a Wolf leader lead this, or start saying the Oath and Law and have them join you)

SLIDE 8

Awesome job Wolves! That is a great way to start a meeting. Now let's talk a bit about names. Did you know all of our names have a meaning? Here are a couple common meanings, Oliver means "descendant of the ancestor", Cole means "victory of the people" Emma means "universal" and Chloe means "verdant and blooming" SLIDE 9

Our Tigers have prepared to share what their names mean. Tigers please raise your hand so we can unmute you to share your name and its meaning.

SLIDE 10

Next up, let's meet two Scouts named Kaleen and Mariam.

SLIDE 11

Kaleen is from Portland, Oregon. She has been a Scout volunteer for more than 10 years. She loves to take hikes, work on trails, and she love to go to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico.

SLIDE 12

Mariam is a Scout from England. Mariam is Muslim and wears a scarf on her head. She loves to go on field trips with her Scouting friends, go to Scouting trainings, and take hikes.

SLIDE 13

Kaleen and Mariam met when they attended training together in West Virginia, and they became fast friends! They have so much in common, not only Scouting but they share a similar sense of humor and a drive to get more girls involved in Scouting programs. Even though they live thousands of miles apart, they will always be friends because of Scouting. Think of some of the friends you have made in Scouting, maybe you wouldn't have met had it not been for Cub

Now let's travel to China, to meet a family in a rural Chinese village that has found a unique way to pass the time during the pandemic. SLIDE 15

Thank you to all who shared! Now the Webelos get a special opportunity to share. In their adventure, it was required that they discuss some of your family names, history, traditions, and culture. Webelos, if you are ready to share, please raise your hand. SLIDE 17

That was super fun, let's keep learning about other cultures! Have you ever wondered what people eat for breakfast in other countries? Let's take this quiz to find out and learn more about countries around the world. We'll show pictures of different foods and type what country you think it comes from in the chat. Here's our first dish. What country do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES) SLIDE 18

If you guessed India, you're right. The dish is Paneer bhurji. It's made of cooked tomatoes, onions and spices topped with fresh crumbled paneer "cottage cheese". Check out these pictures of a market in India along with celebrating at the annual Holi festival.

SLIDE 19

Here's our next dish. What country do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES) .

SLIDE 20

This was a croissant and it's from France. A croissant is a flaky, buttery pastry. Here you can see pictures of France including the Eiffel Tower in Paris.

SLIDE 21

This next dish looks good. What country do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES)

SLIDE 22

If you guessed Russia, you're right. That dish is called Syrniki.

Syrniki is a sweet, fried cottage cheese fritter.

These pictures are of Red Square in Moscow, Russia.

SLIDE 23

Where do you think this dish is from? (READ GUESSES)

SLIDE 24

Those were filled rolls from Scotland. They are crispy and filled with butter and meat. Here is a picture of a Scottish castle in the highlands and a brightly painted coastal village.

SLIDE 25

Here's our next dish. What country do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES)

SLIDE 26

That was toast and vegemite, a popular dish in Australia. Vegemite is a salty spread you can put on toast. Australia has a beautiful coastline and it is one of the world's premier surfing locations.

SLIDE 27

Our next dish looks like dessert! Where do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES)

SLIDE 28

That is called Hagelslag and it's from The Netherlands. It is chocolate sprinkles over buttered bread. The Netherlands are known for their canals in Amsterdam as well as beautiful tulips fields and windmills.

SLIDE 29

This is our last dish. Where do you think it's from? (READ GUESSES)

SLIDE 30

If you guessed England, you're right. This is porridge-creamy oatmeal cooked in milk and flavored with salt, sugar, and other fixings. Here you can see some architecture and landmarks from England including Big Ben and the London Eye.

SLIDE 31

Alright Scouts, now after seeing all those cool places around the world, let's come back home. At home it is important to be good citizens, even when we are not leaving the house. We can make a den duty chart, so we know who is in charge of what before the meetings, just like the Lions and Wolves were in charge of our Flag Ceremony today.

SLIDE 32

We can also make a duty chart at home. Did you make the duty chart in your packet? If so raise your hand, we would love to see it! (Share any duty charts Scouts have). To wrap up today we have one more adventure...an adventure in sound!
